Training Overview

Duration: 3 hours

Target Audience: Volunteers and volunteer-involving organisations

Goal: To develop practical skills that empower participants to

engage young people in volunteering, fostering empathy,

flexibility, and understanding of EU values.

Training Structure

- 1. Introduction (15 minutes)
 - o Welcome, and Icebreaker:
 - Brief introduction of the trainer(s) and participants.
 - Icebreaker activity (e.g., "Two Truths and a Lie" related to volunteering experiences).
 - Objectives and Agenda Overview:
 - Present the training objectives and agenda.
- 2. Understanding Youth Volunteering (30 minutes)
 - Discussion:
 - Overview of the current state of youth volunteering: challenges and opportunities.



 Facilitated discussion on participants' experiences and perceptions of youth volunteering.

Case Study Presentation:

- Share a case study highlighting successful youth engagement in volunteering.
- Discuss key takeaways and strategies used.

3. Interactive Workshop: Engaging Young Volunteers (60 minutes)

Hands-on Activities:

- Split participants into small groups to brainstorm creative strategies for engaging young people.
- Groups share their ideas with the whole group, fostering discussion and feedback.

Role-Playing Scenarios:

- Participants engage in role-playing scenarios to practice conversations with young volunteers.
- Scenarios can include recruitment, addressing concerns, and inspiring commitment.

4. Break (15 minutes)

5. Building Empathy and Flexibility (30 minutes)

Reflection Exercise:

- Guided reflection on the importance of empathy and flexibility in volunteering.
- Participants share personal experiences where these traits made a difference in their engagement with youth.

6. EU Values and Active Citizenship (30 minutes)

Discussion:

 Introduce key EU values related to active citizenship (e.g., solidarity, equality).



 Group discussion on how these values can be integrated into youth volunteering initiatives.

o Reflective Exercise:

 Participants reflect on how they can incorporate EU values in their practices and initiatives.

7. Closing and Evaluation (15 minutes)

Summary of Key Learnings:

Review the main takeaways from the session.

Feedback:

 Participants complete a quick evaluation (can be verbal or written) on the training's effectiveness and areas for improvement.

Networking Opportunity:

 Encourage participants to connect and share contact information for future collaboration.

Facilitation Tips

- Arrive early and set up the room, making sure the room is bright and clean and is conducive to a positive learning environment.
- Arrange and organise refreshments for participants upon arrival.
- Set up chairs in a semicircular manner so everybody gets to see other participants' faces, not the back of someone's head.
- Welcome all attendees personally as they arrive, this will put them at ease as they get to know you and not see you as a "teacher" and rather as a "facilitator"
- Ensure inclusivity by encouraging participation from all attendees. Learners will have different knowledge of EU values and experiences.
- Use clear, accessible plain language and visual aids/exercises to cater to different learning abilities.
- Do not use acronyms and if you have to explain beforehand what the acronym means, for example, "Today you'll hear me mention the European Union however I might also refer to it as the EU, I'll use the full term as much as I can but if you hear me say EU you'll know what I mean, If anyone is unsure at any stage please ask"
- Don't read the slides off the screen, if you are unsure of the content use the
 tutor notes or make notes yourself. Learners can read the slides and don't need
 you to do the same. The slides serve the purpose of visually presenting what
 you are saying and help those who need to see the information.
- Be adaptable to the group's dynamics and adjust the pace or content as necessary.
- Take a break in the middle and encourage learners to get up and move around and stretch themselves, you should have refreshments here too. Be aware that some quieter members of the group may feel more comfortable asking a question during the break one-on-one rather than during the session
- Always be aware of people's time and start and finish on time, if people are late they are late, it's nobody's fault but it is better to respect those who have come on time and start on time.

This structure balances theoretical knowledge with practical skills, fostering an interactive and engaging environment for participants.



Training Goal: To develop practical skills that empower participants to engage young people in volunteering, fostering empathy, flexibility, and understanding of EU values.

Training Structure

1. Introduction (15 minutes)

- Welcome and Icebreaker (5 minutes)
 - Introduction of Trainer(s): Briefly introduce yourself and your background in volunteering and youth engagement.
 - Energiser Activity: "Two Truths and a Lie" related to volunteering. Each participant shares two true statements and one false one about their volunteering experiences. This builds rapport and sets a friendly tone.
- Objectives and Agenda Overview (10 minutes)
 - Present Objectives:
 - Understand the current landscape of youth volunteering.
 - Develop practical skills for engaging young volunteers.
 - Reflect on EU values and their relevance to volunteering.
 - Outline of Agenda:
 - Quick overview of each session and its importance.
- 2. Understanding Youth Volunteering (30 minutes)
 - Discussion (15 minutes)
 - Introduction: Present findings from various countries regarding the state of youth volunteering, highlighting common challenges such as lack of awareness, motivation, and access to opportunities.
 - Facilitated Discussion:
 - Ask participants about their own experiences and perceptions of youth volunteering.
 - Encourage sharing of both successes and challenges faced.
 - Case Study Presentation (15 minutes)



- **Introduction:** Share a successful case study from a country that has effectively engaged youth volunteers (e.g., a community project in a specific country).
- **Key Takeaways:** Discuss strategies such as partnership with schools, use of social media, and mentorship programs.
- Group Discussion: What elements of this case study could be adapted in their own contexts?

3. Interactive Workshop: Engaging Young Volunteers (60 minutes)

- Hands-on Activities (30 minutes)
 - Introduction: Explain that participants will brainstorm ways to engage young people, drawing on their discussions and experiences.
 - Group Activity:
 - Split participants into small groups (4-5 per group).
 - **Task:** Each group will list creative strategies to engage youth, considering the barriers discussed earlier.
 - **Time:** 15 minutes for brainstorming, then 15 minutes to share with the larger group.
- Role-Playing Scenarios (30 minutes)
 - **Introduction:** Highlight the importance of communication skills in engaging young volunteers.
 - Activity:
 - Prepare scenario (e.g., a young person hesitant to join due to time commitments, another feeling unsure about the impact of their contribution).
 - Groups role-play the scenario, focusing on positive engagement strategies.
 - Feedback: After each role-play, participants provide feedback on the effectiveness of the strategies used.

4. Break (15 minutes)



5. Building Empathy and Flexibility (30 minutes)

Reflection Exercise (15 minutes)

 Introduction: Explain that empathy and flexibility are crucial in working with young volunteers, as their needs and concerns can differ greatly.

Guided Reflection:

- Ask participants to reflect individually on a time when empathy changed their interaction with a volunteer.
- Sharing: Invite participants to share their reflections in pairs or small groups.

Interactive Exercise (15 minutes)

Situation Card Exercise:

- Prepare situation cards with various challenges (e.g., a young volunteer facing personal issues, a group dynamic issue).
- Participants respond to the scenario, focusing on empathetic and flexible solutions.
- Discuss how different approaches can affect the outcome.

6. EU Values and Active Citizenship (30 minutes)

Discussion (15 minutes)

 Introduction: Present key EU values such as solidarity, equality, and respect for diversity.

Group Discussion:

- How do these values relate to youth volunteering?
- Share examples from different countries where these values were highlighted in volunteer initiatives.

Reflective Exercise (15 minutes)

- Task: Participants reflect on their own practices and how they can integrate EU values into their volunteer programs.
- **Sharing:** Encourage participants to share their thoughts with the group, fostering a collective learning environment.



7. Closing and Evaluation (15 minutes)

Summary of Key Learnings (5 minutes)

 Recap the main points covered throughout the training, emphasizing the practical skills developed and the importance of EU values.

Feedback (5 minutes)

- Distribute evaluation forms or conduct a quick verbal feedback session.
- Ask participants to share one thing they will take away from the training.

Networking Opportunity (5 minutes)

 Encourage participants to exchange contact information for future collaboration and support.

Support aids to deliver training

Key Takeaways from Powered by V that you should explore during the training

1. The Value of Youth Volunteering

- **Personal Development:** Volunteering offers young people the opportunity to develop crucial life skills such as leadership, communication, teamwork, and problem-solving. These skills enhance employability and personal growth.
- **Community Impact:** Engaging in volunteer work allows youth to make a meaningful difference in their communities. They contribute to social causes, strengthen community ties, and promote a culture of solidarity and support.

2. Understanding Challenges in Youth Volunteering

- Lack of Awareness: Many young people are unaware of the volunteering opportunities available to them. Outreach and marketing efforts must effectively communicate the benefits and possibilities of volunteering.
- **Financial Barriers:** Financial constraints can limit young people's ability to engage in volunteer activities. Providing support, such as travel reimbursements or stipends, can alleviate this barrier.
- Accessibility Issues: Volunteering programs must be inclusive and accessible
 to all young people, including those with disabilities or from marginalized
 backgrounds. Ensuring facilities and programs accommodate diverse needs is
 essential.

3. Best Practices for Engaging Young Volunteers

- Outreach and Recruitment: Employ creative and diverse methods to engage young people, such as social media campaigns, informational workshops, and collaborations with schools and community organizations.
- **Mentorship and Support:** Establish mentorship programs that pair young volunteers with experienced mentors. This support can enhance confidence and retention in volunteering roles.
- Flexible Opportunities: Create flexible volunteer roles that allow young people
 to contribute according to their availability and interests. Short-term and
 project-based opportunities can attract more participants.



4. Integrating EU Values into Volunteer Programmes

- **Solidarity:** Emphasise the importance of community support and collective action. Encourage young people to see volunteering as a way to stand in solidarity with those in need.
- **Respect for Diversity:** Promote inclusion by recognising and celebrating the diverse backgrounds and experiences of young volunteers. This respect enhances the volunteering experience and fosters understanding.
- **Empowerment:** Empower young people to take the lead in volunteering initiatives. Encourage them to voice their ideas and take ownership of projects, fostering a sense of agency and responsibility.

5. Action Steps for Participants

- **Reflect on Motivations:** Encourage participants to reflect on their motivations for volunteering and how they can inspire others to get involved.
- **Identify Opportunities:** Challenge participants to identify local volunteering opportunities that align with their passions and interests, as well as those of their peers.
- **Network and Collaborate:** Emphasize the importance of building networks among volunteers, organizations, and community members to create a supportive environment for youth engagement.





Policy Recommendations: Youth Engagement & Volunteering in Strengthening EU Values (Plain language version)

Introduction

The **European Youth Strategy** (2019–2027) aims to engage and empower young people by promoting active citizenship, social inclusion, and solidarity. Volunteering is recognized as an important way for young people to express key EU values such as human dignity, freedom, democracy, and equality. The **European Solidarity Corps** offers various volunteering opportunities, but there is a need for more support to expand these programs and improve the quality of volunteering experiences.

Key Points

1. Sustainable Development Goals:

- o The EU has priorities for sustainable development for 2023-2024.
- Volunteering is essential for achieving these goals, but it's not adequately highlighted in current EU plans.

2. Citizenship Education:

- o The EU Parliament has identified a need for better citizenship education.
- o More research is needed to measure the impact of volunteering.
- Schools should teach EU values and encourage community engagement through both formal and informal learning.

3. Benefits of Volunteering:

 Volunteering can improve voting behaviour, job prospects, educational performance, mental health, and social connections.

4. Solidarity Across Europe:

 Research shows that young people in different EU countries share similar views on solidarity (like empathy and community support).



 There are challenges such as political polarization and negative attitudes towards migrants, but a basic understanding of solidarity is common.

Recommendations for Policymakers

Challenge 1: Update Volunteering Policies

• **Problem:** Current policies don't adapt well to modern volunteering trends like micro-volunteering, episodic volunteering or informal volunteering

Solutions:

- Revise policies at local, national, and EU levels to support new volunteering forms.
- Collaborate with stakeholders to create a unified approach to promoting EU values.
- o Establish a common framework for regular research on volunteering.

Challenge 2: Recognise the value of volunteering

• **Problem:** There's a lack of awareness about the role of volunteering in promoting EU values.

Solutions:

- Incorporate EU values into school curricula and educational programs from an early age.
- Promote the idea that volunteering is as important as paid jobs in contributing to society.
- o Increase funding for the European Solidarity Corps to enhance its impact.

Challenge 3: Support Volunteer Involving Organisations (VIOs)

• **Problem:** Many volunteer involving organisations lack adequate funding and resources to provide volunteering opportunities.

Solutions:

- Ensure transparent funding and support for organizations that involve young volunteers.
- Reduce administrative burdens for these organizations and help them build capacity.
- Create systems for effective volunteer coordination, especially in crisis situations, with appropriate support and funding.



Additional optional exercise Game Title: EU Values Quest

Objective:

To enhance understanding of EU values and the role of youth volunteering in promoting these values while fostering teamwork and engagement among participants.

Duration: 30 minutes

Materials Needed:

- Index cards or slips of paper (one for each team)
- Markers or pens
- Timer
- · Whiteboard or flip chart for debriefing
- **Prizes** (optional, for the winning team)

Preparation:

- Create Value Cards: Prepare cards with descriptions of various EU values (e.g., human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, rule of law, human rights) along with corresponding volunteer actions that exemplify these values (e.g., organising a community clean-up, mentoring youth, advocating for human rights).
- 2. **Team Formation**: Divide participants into small teams (4-6 members each).

Game Instructions:

Part 1: Value Match-Up (15-20 minutes)

- 1. **Distribute Value Cards**: Hand out the value cards randomly among the teams.
- 2. **Team Discussion**: Instruct each team to discuss and match their value cards with appropriate volunteer actions they believe exemplify those values. Each team should come up with at least one action for each value they have.
- 3. **Presentation**: After 10 minutes of discussion, each team presents their matched values and volunteer actions to the whole group.



Part 2: Value Scenarios (15-20 minutes)

- 1. **Create Scenarios**: After the presentations, give each team a different scenario that a young volunteer might face (e.g., organizing a community event, helping refugees, engaging in environmental activism).
- 2. **Team Brainstorming**: Teams will brainstorm how they would respond to the scenario while applying the relevant EU values and proposing specific volunteering actions.
- 3. **Share Responses**: Each team shares their scenario and proposed response with the group.

Debriefing (10 minutes):

- Discuss the importance of each value and how volunteering can enhance the understanding and practice of these values.
- Encourage participants to reflect on how they can integrate these values into their own volunteering experiences and share their thoughts on how volunteering can promote solidarity and community engagement.

Optional: Prize Distribution

If you choose to add a competitive element, you could award a small prize to the team that presents the most creative or impactful action plan.

Learning Outcomes:

- Participants will gain a deeper understanding of EU values.
- Teams will practice collaboration and creative thinking.
- The game will encourage participants to consider practical applications of volunteering in promoting EU values.



Interactive workshop 4 EU Values Exercise

Below are the Core EU Values:

- 1. **Human Dignity** Respecting the intrinsic worth of all individuals.
- 2. **Freedom** Ensuring personal liberty and autonomy, including the freedom of speech and thought.
- 3. **Democracy** Promoting active participation in decision-making processes and governance.
- 4. **Equality** Ensuring that all people are treated equally under the law and have access to the same opportunities.
- 5. **Rule of Law** Ensuring that laws apply equally to all citizens and that governance is based on laws rather than arbitrary decisions.
- 6. **Human Rights** Protecting and promoting the fundamental rights and freedoms of all individuals.
